Jealousy of Trade is a compilation of glittering historical scholarship that creaks from the strain of the contrivances for compiling it. Its value lies in bringing much-deserved attention to a number of essays that otherwise would not have received it. That is value enough for an edited volume - but this volume declares greater aspirations.

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Jealousy of trade is depicted as a post-Machiavellian phenomenon with strong post-Hobbesian undertones and refers to the juxtaposition of politics and economy at a point when success in international trade became imperative for the military and political survival of the state and acquisition of external economic resources was deemed essential for both self-preservation and grandezza.

In Jealousy of Trade, Hume noted the tendency of countries to see those more successful than themselves as threats in what is presented as the zero-sum game of economic warfare in which one country's gain is another's loss, rather than a positive-sum game of trading in which all participants benefit.

The title Jealousy of Trade of course refers to the title of one of Hume's famous essays. What now becomes clear especially in reading Hont's introduction (which runs to 156 pages) is how entangled the ideas of the eighteenth-century economic writers, including Smith, were in the discussion concerning the role of the state in commercial society.

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"Jealousy of trade" was expressly denounced by Hume in his essay of that title, while theWealth of Nations, Hont writes, "was completely focussed on the achievement of economic superiority overothers, without malice" (123).
